An Awesome Waldorf 100 Gift

A beautiful, handcrafted renovation of our hall has been taking place over the past two weeks.

This is a gift to our school made possible through the generosity of our sister school in Erfurt Germany.

During the past year Class 11 students (17-year olds) Erfurt Waldorf School have been raising funds for this project. With their carpenter teacher Christiane, they have bought wood, hired a van and loaded it with carpentry machinery, wood and curtain material and made the long drive to Cambridge.

For the past two weeks half of the Erfurt class have been here working on the hall: cleaning, painting, making skirting boards, curtain pelmets, making benches for the younger classes, beautiful cushions for them to kneel on and sewing new curtains for the hall. They have been supported by two other women who have given up their time for our school.

The Class has brought the best of teenage vitality into our school, care and beauty in their work – and even a demonstration of eurythmy and song.

We have of course shown them around Cambridge, the University Library, taken them punting, hosted them in our homes, spoken English with them and fed them – thank you Hollie, Rebecca, Clara, Charlotte D, Catherina, Tina – and Rupert for the Trinity punts. This renovation could also not have taken place without the additional gift from and former-trustee of £5,000. Though the person asked not to be named, we are truly grateful. I hope you will agree that the school is a happier, healthier and more beautiful place to be with this gift at its heart.

Short Biographies:

Beate Guertler-Green Early Years' Coordinator



Having grown up in a beautiful village in Germany, I lived a childhood nurtured by the freedom to roam in the outdoors, explore for myself, and invent and direct street games. I always felt an affinity for working with children and have been able to develop this passion since I started in Cambridge Steiner School in 2000. The outdoors has always been my passion and I am proud that we are now in our 10th year of running our woodland programme for the kindergartens. This has been hugely beneficial for the children and served as a model which many other settings followed. Being the teacher of Elderflower Kindergarten for 11 years, I now enjoy supporting other teachers and staff to develop the gifts and skills they bring. I love working in this community and I will never cease to see the magic which the children bring to this world. Being a role model in all we do and are is the most important thing I have learnt.

As a member of the School Coordination Team I am

keen to develop close links between Early Years and the Lower School, and improve communication on all levels. I hope to continue to contribute to make our school a vibrant and sustainable place, so that future generations of children can thrive in this environment. I love reading biographies, enjoy a good dance and being out in nature. I studied pedagogy in Germany (level 6) and qualified as a Steiner Early Years Teacher (level 5) in London in 2009.

I spent my own early childhood in East Africa and my family later moved to the Scottish Borders. I studied Combined Social Sciences at Durham University, specialising in Education. Before university I spent some time volunteering at the Gaia Waldorf School in Cape Town, and after I graduated from Durham and moved to Cambridge it wasn't long before I had found my way into the classrooms at Cambridge Steiner School, teaching subject lessons in the Lower School and assisting in the Kindergarten. Alongside my work at the school I completed the West of England Steiner Teacher Training course and in 2012 I became a Class Teacher in the Lower School. In the following year I joined the school management team. In 2015 I left the school to start a family, though I continued to support the Lower School in a voluntary capacity. In January 2019 I took up

the post of Lower School Coordinator. In this role, I hold overall responsibility for the running of the department and for monitoring the quality of teaching and assessment, pupil's learning, the curriculum and pupil's personal development. I represent the Lower School in the School Coordination Team.

Waldorf 100 Hanging – Exhibition Feedback

Here's some feedback from one of the members of the Guild of Weavers, Spinners and Dyers following the recent exhibition where our wall-hanging was displayed:

I wanted to give you some feedback about your school's contribution to our event.

The artwork itself is magnificent, the quality is superb and the content engaging, but I think more important was the input from the children. The project reminded me strongly of my own education in the 1960's, learning without children even realising they're doing it, which I think is a wonderful way to educate - I speak as a retired science teacher.

We had many young visitors during the two days, many of whom had worked on the project, and they were, without exception, a joy to talk to. They all explained their part in the project and told me what others had done, clearly proud of their own work and that of their fellow pupils. In addition they were interested in the activities of the Guild, I joined a group who were watching a demonstration of tapestry weaving and was impressed by the intelligent questions they asked - clearly they were thinking the process through.

Please pass on my congratulations to all who were involved in the project, pupils, parents and staff - perhaps particularly the staff who are clearly doing a wonderful job in these very tough times for education.

St John's/Midsummer Celebrations – 24th June 1-3pm

Midsummer entices us to dream with its long warm sunny days, blossoms and sweet scents. But there is always the danger of getting lost in this - as you will see in Class 7/8's production of 'A Midsummer Night's Dream'. It delightfully illustrates how Fairyland makes mockery of us humans when we lose ourselves in the joys of summer. The celebration of St John's (24th June), a few days after the Summer Solstice, calls us back from dreaminess to address what is important – both in ourselves and in the world around us. Part of this

celebration involves the purifying, transformative power of fire. Fire rituals have been associated with Midsummer since ancient times: fires were jumped and cattle driven through the dying embers.
